1. Barter is trading one good for another without using money. List three things that Virginia colonists used to barter for the goods and services they wanted and needed. (Hint: The answers are near the Yap stone.) (Econ 2.8)

Answer: Any three of the following answers are correct:
Pelts, Musket Balls, Iron Nails, Farm Products, Wampum



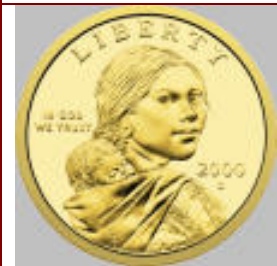
2. Name the Colonial coin that was made for Virginia. Who was the King of England when this coin was issued? (Hint: The answers can be found in a display called Colonial Coin and Currency.) (USI.6c)

Answer: *Virginia Halfpenny; King George III.* In 1773, George III granted Virginia the power to mint its own coins.



3. Who was the first real-life woman portrayed on a regular issue American coin? (Hint: The answer is in the case that says “Twentieth Century Coinage”.) (Civics 2.11, USI.8d, USII.3e)

Answer: *Susan B. Anthony.* Susan B. Anthony was a prominent suffragette (advocate for voting rights for women). A dollar coin was issued in 1979 to honor her.



4. What is the value of the coin bearing the image of Sacagawea, the only female member of the group that explored the Louisiana Purchase with Lewis and Clark in 1804-1806? (Hint: The answer is in the case that says “Twentieth Century Coinage.”) (VUS.6a)

Answer: *One dollar.* Sacagawea was the young, Native American wife of a French-Canadian trader. She served as guide, interpreter, and many other important functions for the Corps.



5. What is the name of the bank founded by Maggie Lena Walker in Richmond in 1903? (Hint: The answer can be found near the door.) (VS.9c)

Answer: *St. Luke Penny Savings Bank.* Walker was the first African-American female bank president. Her bank became an integral part of the economic advancement of Richmond’s African-American community.
