Mayor Rawlings-Blake will kick-off our inter-city dialog by discussing how she intends to achieve her 10K goal, have this goal guide nearly every aspect of Baltimore’s redevelopment, and the initiatives she is launching or expanding. Leaders of Cleveland, Detroit and Philadelphia will highlight the work these cities are doing to attract new residents and investment to their neighborhoods and downtown.

10:00 a.m. ***Promising and Proven Strategies: An Exchange Among Cities***

Many older industrial cities have experienced similar losses of population and employment and increases in poverty and vacant property. The great recession has made them even more fragile economically. But, “you got to be tough to live in Cleveland,” as the saying goes, and all cities joining today share this spirit. All are fighting disinvestment and determined to regain economic vitality. In this unique convening, they will share ways they are working to attract and retain residents, encourage investment, and foster assets and innovation.

This videoconference exchange among leaders from Baltimore, Cleveland, Detroit and Philadelphia will discuss the strategies they are using to bring new vitality and investment to their cities, attracting and retaining residents and businesses.
